Christmas is a uniquely Christian holiday. It celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ, who for Christians is the Son of God. The name 'Christmas' underscores it's unique religious content.


Christmas is the shortened form of "Christ's Mass". The term 'mass' carries the meaning of thanksgiving and is often used in connection with the celebration of Holy Communion.

Christmas is the most celebrated holiday in the world. For the Christian, Christmas has deep spiritual significance centering in the birth of Jesus in a manger in the city of Bethlehem. To the secular world it has become the most commercialized period of the year. In America, many stores anticipate grossing anywhere from 25% - 40% of their annual sales from the last week of November until the end of December.

When one pauses to contemplate it, Christmas has a profound impact on every person regardless of their religious understanding. Every time one celebrates a birthday, or a person consults the calendar, we use Jesus Christ as our reference point. All of history is divided between two periods: BC standing for "before Christ" and AD representing the Latin "anno Domini" which means literally, "in the year of our Lord".







LeTourneau is best
known as the "dean of
earthmoving." This
title was given to him
during and after World
War II when machines
designed and produced by Letourneau
had been a major
factor in winning the
war.

Thousands of different pieces of earth moving equipment were used in

building roads, airports, and military bases all over the world as the war effort moved and grew.

LeTourneau's experience in welding in the shipyards on the West Coast convinced engineers that ships could be built faster and stronger by welding the metal pieces together instead of by riveting.

Probably the best-known piece of earthmoving equipment was the two-wheeled tractor that was called Tourna pull. This tractor pulled a scraper that would collect dirt needed to build road surfaces. Once loaded, the Tourna pull could travel much more rapidly to get the dirt to the location where it was needed.

An off shoot of the Tourna pull was LeTourneau's development of huge, low pressure rubber tires that enabled these huge, heavy machines to travel over rough and wet terrain. During his lifetime of designing new equipment, LeTourneau had over 300 U. S. Patents to his credit.

Brought up in a Plymouth Brethren home, LeTourneau was regular in his attendance at church. As a teenager, he gave his heart to the Lord Jesus. His salvation experience while not earth shaking, was genuine. As a young man he surrendered his life to the Lord and was determined to pursue is love for building earthmoving equipment. During this period, he made God His business partner.

When one studies the magnitude and variety of machines he developed, one would assume that LeTourneau was a highly trained engineer. The truth is that RG LeTourneau was a sixth grade drop out who at the age of 14 began working in an iron foundry in Portland, Oregon.

At the age of 29 LeTourneau found himself jobless and \$5,000.00 in debt. He jumped at an opportunity to level a large piece of land for a wealthy rancher. He found himself fascinated with earth moving equipment and began building newer and bigger machines in his own shop in California.



The next decade of his life did not improve and at age 40 he was again jobless with an indebtedness of \$100,000.00. As a devout Christian, he was determined to pay back every dollar he owed while at the same time reaching out by faith to give \$5,000.00 to missions each year through his church. To pay off this indebtedness he sold much of his equipment.

At this point, LeTourneau decided that his future was in designing, building, and selling earth moving equipment. He moved his corporate headquarters to Peoria, Illinois to be close to the Caterpillar engine factory. In 1932, in the very heart of the Great Depression, LeTourneau began to realize profits in his business. By 1938 he had broken the million-dollar mark in profits.

During this period of growth LeTourneau's wife, Evelyn, suggested that they give 90% of their income to the Lord's work and live off just 10%. With this money they founded the Letourneau Foundation from which millions of dollars have been

given to missions, educational grants, and scholarships.

In his later years, RG LeTourneau became a noted speaker to churches across America and around the world. He shared his testimony of how God led him in life and challenged others to do more for the Lord.

LeTourneau ever thought of himself as a common layperson. In life, he was an extremely uncommon man. He learned from life and from the Lord. One of his best-known quotes was: "I ran into a sign on a safety bulletin board one time that went like this: 'Where did you get your good



judgment?' 'From my experience.' 'And where did you get your experience?' 'From my bad judgment.'"

Only heaven will reveal how much of this earth was moved by RG LeTourneau through his life and his love for the Lord.
